The Link between Personality and Academic Success

Research demonstrates that personality predicts student performance in college over and above achievement test scores and high school grades. Recent findings include:

- A large-scale, independently reviewed analysis indicates that the broad personality factor *Conscientiousness* has consistent ability to predict student grades. Called *Self-Control* in the 16PF® Questionnaire, this factor measures students' self-discipline and respect for policies, procedures, and structure.
- The same 2007 study found that the relationship between personality and grade point average holds up across more than 40 individual studies at colleges and universities in North America, Europe and Australia.
- A second independent and comprehensive analysis of the research into various student characteristics shows that personal factors such as achievement motivation and self-confidence can predict college success and retention. This report summarized findings from more than 100 studies.

These large studies clearly demonstrate the value of personality information for understanding who will perform well academically. In addition, the results are very consistent with the research that demonstrates the value of personality for predicting job performance.

- seem to have an active imagination. However, more practical, down-to-earth people who place value on focusing on the situation and its demands may view you as being too preoccupied with your ideas and thoughts.
- are very much an individual. You seldom get overly concerned about what others may think is the practical thing to do. Even though you may see that others are not listening to your ideas, you are not usually bothered by this rejection because you are inclined to be mostly wrapped up in your own thoughts.

Developing an Action Plan

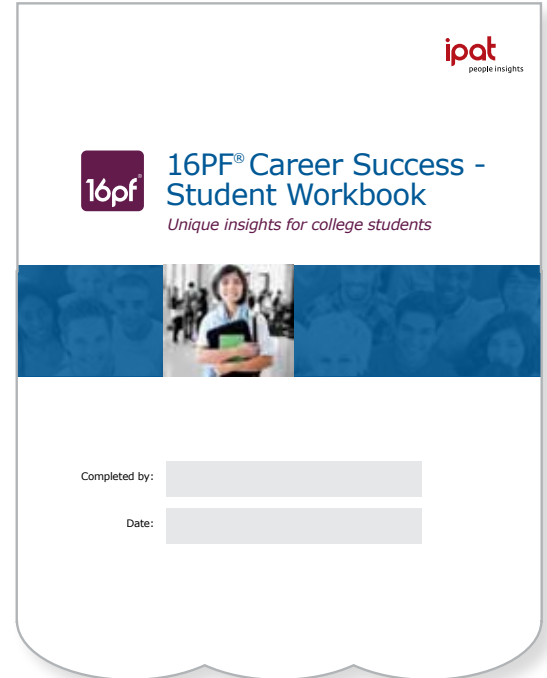
Additional questions are presented for the student to answer for each career of interest, along with suggested exercises and specific action items to help prepare for their future job hunt.
